TITLED "THE HYMN IN ADORATION OF THE LAMB," the cover art is part of a larger woodcut by Albrecht Dürer (1471–1528), a renowned Renaissance painter and print maker. Regarding this woodcut, Concordia Seminary New Testament scholar and hymnwriter Martin Franzmann (1907–76) wrote: "Look at the woodcut of Albrecht Dürer's where he depicts that scene from the Apocalypse in which those that came from the great tribulation, who have washed their robes in the blood of the Lamb, sing their heavenly song. Look at those faces, their intensity of concentration, faces almost contorted with the energy of their devotion, if you would know what singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord really means" ("Theology Must Sing," in *Ha! Ha! Among the Trumpets*, Concordia Publishing House, 1994).



First Reading Revelation 7:9–17

L A reading from the Revelation to St. John, the seventh chapter.

After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude that no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed in white robes, with palm branches in their hands, and crying out with a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!" And all the angels were standing around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, saying, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, "Who are these, clothed in white robes, and from where have they come?" I said to him, "Sir, you know." And he said to me, "These are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb.

"Therefore they are before the throne of God, and serve him day and night in his temple; and he who sits on the throne will shelter them with his presence. They shall hunger no more, neither thirst anymore;

the sun shall not strike them,

nor any scorching heat.

For the Lamb in the midst of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of living water, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.")

Then he strictly charged the disciples to tell no one that he was the Christ.




Collect for Peace
