Your Donations at Work

Campus landscaping, \$2,000

The Seminary sits on 72 acres of beautifully landscaped grounds. Since 1992, Gayle Zollmann has helped to keep those grounds beautiful. In 2012, she became the grounds coordinator. Gayle grew up in Wentzville, Mo., but now she and her husband live a few blocks from the Seminary, and their four children have grown up on campus. She has degrees in agronomy and horticulture from the University of Missouri.

Campus landscaping has long been a service project supported by the Sem Guild. As early as 1992, the Guild was working with the Seminary's grounds crew. Gayle recalls that some of the first donations were barbeque pits and picnic tables for the students that are still used today. More donations that live on are the numerous hostas in the Academic Quad. It's possible almost every hosta on campus originated from an original single donation. The cross of daffodils planted on the hill above Demun Avenue in recent years, for all of the neighborhood to see, is another Guild project.

Although a few jobs are outsourced, like mowing and large tree removal, most everything else is done in-house. Currently, five students work with Gayle. Other students who work with Campus Facilities/ Environmental Services help out as needed.

In 2019–20, the Guild raised \$2,000 for campus landscaping. Those funds were used to establish a large vegetable garden where the Fritz and Mezger dorms had been located and to run water to the garden. The vegetables grown there are available to the students through the Food Bank.

The Guild hopes to raise \$4,000 for campus landscaping in the 2020–21 academic year. This money will be used to help purchase 40 fruit trees to be planted around campus and in a large grove adjacent to the vegetable (Continued on Page 2)

And although so many things have changed in our lives recently, we rejoice in knowing that God never changes.

Where Were You When ...

Dr. August Suelflow, former director of the Concordia Historical Institute and adjunct professor at Concordia Seminary, spoke at the Sem Guild's 50th anniversary tea Feb. 19, 1982. The following is an excerpt from his speech:

"Nineteen thirty-two was a particularly taxing and demanding year. Thirteen million people were unemployed. Business losses were estimated at between 5 and 6 billion dollars as the great financial depression continued. Two and a half years had passed since the famous stock market crash in October 1929.

"It was during the '30s that only very few Seminary graduates received a call; many times there were only one or two out of an entire class who were fortunate enough to be placed.

"As one reflects on the unbelievably poor economic conditions at that time ... one must, indeed, speak about the phenomenal and sacrificial giving by the members of the 'Student's Welfare Committee,' and later the Seminary Guild, in order to support and assist the future pastors of the Synod. Many a pastor who graduated during that decade still speaks words of profound gratitude to the good ladies who saw him through the Seminary by keeping him fed and clothed.

"In the name of countless seminarians, past and present, on this 50th anniversary, accept the gratitude of a grateful church for such marvelous services rendered. May the Lord of the church continue to bless you in all you do in His service."


Mason Vieth
