#### INTRODUCING OUR NEW LOGO

The Sem Guild Board of Directors recently approved a new logo created by Courtney Koll, a graphic designer working with Concordia Seminary. Courtney explains the idea for the new logo:

"Four years ago, when my husband and I first moved to St. Louis, my grandparents came to visit. My grandfather is an alumnus of Concordia Seminary and wanted to give us a special tour of campus. We were shown the old chapel, known today as Werner Auditorium. He pointed out the apartment where he used to live (just off DeMun Avenue) that was owned by the Seminary at the time. He showed us where the old bookstore had been located, which is now the home office of Lutheran Women in Mission (LWML). It was interesting to see how things had changed in the almost 60 years since my grandfather attended Seminary.

"When I was tasked with the project to update the Seminary Guild logo, I thought about that day four years ago, how the Seminary had undergone so many changes throughout the years and how those changes benefited so many along the way. I also thought about all the ways the Guild had supported the Seminary throughout the years.

"As I sketched out my ideas, I thought it important to walk the line of old and new. I was drawn to imagery of laurel wreaths, as they remind me of this perfect dichotomy of historical and contemporary. This classic imagery has been used for centuries and yet still feels new and fresh. It has been popularized recently along with modernized calligraphy, something I thought to incorporate in the fonts I chose for the logo. I also appreciate how a laurel wreath's crown shape has historically represented Christ, our reason for all that we do as a Seminary and the Seminary Guild.

"I am so thrilled with the way the new Seminary Guild logo came out, and I hope you love it too! The Seminary will always have a special place in my heart as it holds so much history for me and my family. I know my story is not unique and that there are many seminarians, past and present, who have had fathers and grandfathers attend here before them. The Guild's support for these families is so wonderful! I hope this new logo will assist the Seminary Guild in attracting new members of all generations to come together and support the Seminary for years in the future."



#### **Powerful Prayer**

This article appeared in the Seminary Guild's 50th anniversary booklet, which was researched by Juanita Hahn Wolf.

One member of the sewing society related the following incident shortly before her death: In 1849, Concordia Seminary relocated to a plot on South Jefferson Avenue. One of the earliest groups offering aid was "Mrs. Walther's Sewing Circle." The sewing circle met during an unusually dry period of the year. Much lamentation regarding the drought was heard at the meeting. After having listened for some time to the complaints, Mrs. Emilie Walther arose and said, "My dear friends, we don't pray enough; this drought is due partly to the lack of prayer. Let us all kneel and fervently petition the Lord to send us rain."

All knelt while Mrs. Walther led in prayer. Thereupon the women busied themselves again with the task of sewing for needy students; when lo and behold, from the distance came the sound of rolling thunder. The sun became obscured, clouds gathered, lightning flashed and even before the meeting adjourned, their prayer was answered as a welcome rain refreshed the parched earth.
